

If only they spoke a little Yiddish in the White House, things would be much better. Yiddish is a darkly comic language of complaint, a way to look at the dark side of life and still laugh at it.

If Anthony Scaramucci had only cursed the writer of the New Yorker Magazine in Yiddish instead of his profanitylaced comments, he would still be the White House Communications Director today.

"Abi gezunt dos leben ken men zikh ale mol nemen" sounds nice in Yiddish, right? Translated it means roughly, "Stay healthy because you can kill yourself later." I'll bet the writer at the New Yorker would have thought he was praising him.

Yiddish developed out of Herbrew and German, and became its own culture, with a unique mode of expression all of its own. Half of those expressions just happen to be insults.

If President Trump had spoken to the President of Mexico, Pena Nieto, in a little bit of Yiddish asking, "Vi iz di mishpukah?" "How is the family?" I bet Pena Nieto would then pay for at least half of the wall.

Can you imagine the President tweeting in Yiddish? Much better and less offensive.

On the other hand, a good Yiddish curse can really cut an opponent down to size or deflate an overblown ego, and some of the curses are pretty funny. Such as:

"A groys gesheft zol er hobin mit shroyre: vus er hot, zol men bay im nit fregen, un vos men fregt zol nisht haben. Which is translated to: " He should have a large store, and whatever people ask for he shouldn't have, and what he does have shouldn't be requested."

Or "Es sol dir dunern in boykh, vestu meyen az s'iz a homon klaper. Which is translated to: "Your stomach will rumble so badly, you'll think it was a Purim noisemaker."
