## In Memory of Sheldon Rothberg

We are sorry to announce the death of Sheldon Rothberg, z'l, who served as the spiritual leader of our congregation for seven years in the 1980-1990s. Rabbi Cohen officiated his funeral at our synagogue on Friday morning, January 24<sup>th</sup>. The sanctuary was filled with family members, current and former members of the congregation, and many colleagues and friends. Burial took place in Woburn, MA following the funeral. Our heartfelt condolences to Sheldon's family. May his memory be for a blessing...

Sheldon's obituary as it appeared in the Berkshire Eagle and the Berkshire Edge:

Sheldon Ira Rothberg, 81, a longtime resident of Sheffield, MA passed away peacefully on January 22, 2020 surrounded by his loving family. In 2015, he became a resident of Fairview Commons Nursing Home in Great Barrington

Sheldon was born in Boston, MA on August 8, 1938, the son of Morris and Helen Rothberg. He graduated from The University of Vermont in 1962 where he returned to earn his Masters in 1967. He and his wife, Linda moved to Pittsfield, MA in 1970 with their two children, Adam and Jude.

He married his second wife, Heidi in 1982 and they lived with their daughter Natana in Sheffield, MA.

Sheldon was Professor of English and Humanities at Berkshire Community College from 1970 - 2002 and founded and led Project Outreach Seniors beginning in 1978. He loved the poetry of Emily Dickinson, the plays of William Shakespeare, airplanes, and teaching, and he was beloved by his students. His love for Judaism led him to serve for seven years as spiritual leader at Temple Ahavath Sholom in Great Barrington, MA.

He is survived by his brother Warren, his ex-wives Linda and Heidi, his children Natana and her partner Ben, Adam and his wife Lisa, and Jude and her husband Rob.

### Coming Together, Start Close In

On January 19<sup>th</sup>, Sunday morning, members of the congregation met to discuss their thoughts and feelings about the rising anti-Semitism in our community and the world. As might be expected, our reactions were wide-ranging, but the opportunity to speak, listen, and share our experiences was invaluable. Barbara began the session by reading a poem by David Whyte that spoke to taking a first step, and many of the congregants had already given some thought to positive actions in this dark time. Some suggested an increase of political activism; some to the larger issue of "othering" many people, not only Jews, at this time and speaking out against bigotry, no matter whom it targets (only in a safe environment). There were many other threads of discussion, and I invite those who attended to add their thoughts and observations to subsequent newsletter articles and letters.

As for myself, I had been brooding for some time about my reluctance to speak up when thoughtless and cruel remarks were spoken by casual acquaintances in my presence. Fear and habitual avoidance of confrontations have kept me quiet too many times in the past. So I decided to do some research to find some responses to have at the ready. I have no way of knowing if I can change even one mind, but I do know that speaking my truth, saying out loud what I believe is right and good, will make me stronger.

I googled what to say to a bigot, and the first two links were from University of Massachusetts and The Southern Poverty Law Center. Both have extensive articles on speaking up. I recommend them both. In "Speak Up: Responding to Everyday Bigotry" SPLC addresses many different scenarios, but I will just quote from the "Six Steps to Speaking Up

Against Everyday Bigotry" that concludes the article. It should be said that these suggestions are for speaking to people we know. No one is advocating putting ourselves in physical danger.

What follows quotes directly from SPLC's webpage.

Be ready. You know another moment like this will come up again, so prepare yourself for it. Think of yourself as the one who will speak up. Promise yourself not to remain silent.... have something to say in mind before an incident happens. Open-ended questions often are a good response. "Why do you say that?" "How did you develop that belief?"

- Identify the behavior. In other words, give that person neutral feedback on what you observe.
- 2. Appeal to principles.
- 3. Set limits.
- 4. Find an ally/be an ally.
- 5. Be vigilant. Stay prepared, and keep speaking up. Don't risk silence. If you don't speak up, you're surrendering part of yourself. You're letting bigotry win.

I hope we have more meetings of this kind, and I hope to see you there.


#### Milchidika with Marty: Synagogue Newsletters

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


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
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
