

P.G.'s Tees

I'm going into business selling tee shirts. I'm 88 and it's taken me awhile to get here, but I think I was destined to go into the clothing business. The route has been circuitous.

It started when I was 10 with my first job. It dealt with clothing. I became a delivery boy for Mr. Brenner, the tailor. I was proud to be independent and make money — both linked to clothes. I've had lots of jobs since then and at last I'm returning to clothing. Let me describe some of the career steps I've taken before returning to my calling.

Having delivery boy experience, I took a step up on the career ladder and turned to newspapers. Better pay and more fun to ride a bike and throw papers than to walk while carrying pressed pants on a hanger. I dropped out of high school and worked in a potato chip factory. Good money for a kid but not to my liking. I made money playing gin rummy. It was fun but not reliable. Then I was in charge of the hot dog counter at Dave's Delicatessen.



I took the GED and went to college. Dishwashing and playing cards helped with expenses. After college I spent some time in the Army, then taught grade school after my discharge. With the aid of the GI Bill I got my doctorate and became a college professor and author.

I moved from New York City to the Berkshires in the late 60's and opened a private practice in psychology.

On a trip to London in 1996, I saw a sign in a hardware store offering an art class. I took the class and fell in love with painting. Returning home, I rented a studio in Pittsfield, gradually closed my psychology practice and became a 24/7 painter. By now, my paintings have been shown all over. But with the pandemic, galleries and museums have closed. I keep on painting and thinking about outlets for my work. Somehow, from somewhere the idea of making tee shirts came to me. A new venue!

What goes around comes around. I started in clothing and here I am some 78 years later coming back to my calling.

What kind of shirts one might ask? Unique ones —Images will be from my museum paintings - silk screened onto high quality all cotton tee shirts.

December Creative Arts Workshop: The Digital Darkroom

The December Creative Arts Workshop, *The Digital Darkroom*, will take place on Sunday, December 13 at 2:00 p.m. In this third photography workshop offered by Arthur Hillman, the focus will be on the use of the computer and smartphone to edit and revise photographs similar to the way a traditional photographer would work in a conventional wet darkroom. Prior to this Zoom workshop, each participant will submit a group of his or hers own photographs that will form the basis of an exploration using a number of image-editing software programs. Traditional techniques such as cropping, dodging and burning, contrast adjustments, color modification and other approaches will be demonstrated. Creating montages and adding and manipulating type to create cards and posters will also be explored. A minimum donation of \$10 is requested to support our Creative Arts programs. 


