Thursday Evening Lecture Series: "Matches Made in Heaven" A talk by Genealogist Keren Weiner

Genealogy Research Uncovers Love Stories in a Family of Jewish Immigrants.

What do we know of our ancestors' deepest commitments beyond the names and the date?

Follow one immigrant family from New Orleans during the Civil War era through their move to New York City. Research methods from the internet to the telephone reveal how they survived war, epidemic, fire and who knows what else - to leave loving legacies that inspire us all.

"Case studies are the best way to shed light on what genealogy and family research is all about. Through working on these personal family histories, I have learned that there is much more to be found than census records when researching one's family history. If we've got enough for the family tree boxes with birth and death dates, that's all well and good. But when we dive deeper into the individual stories of our ancestors, we have the opportunity to learn so much more. Each of the families I've researched met challenges before, during, and after immigration that would leave us reeling if we had to meet them today. Conquering formidable circumstances, they immigrated, they migrated, and they worked, raising their families and providing rich legacies along the way. It is those legacies that I seek to illuminate... the threads of the past that have woven themselves into the fabric of who we are today. Their stories are revealed in the documents, the pictures, and in the memories of our family members.

The case study I'll be sharing when we meet on June 7, is one of my favorites. I selected it, not only because I can use it to illustrate basic procedures in genealogical research and off-the-internet surprising resources, but because there are examples of love and romance in it that made my eyes shine and gave me the sense that I could travel through time."

Keren has been a researcher for over 20 years and involved in genealogical research for the last 14 years. Her careers have included roles in market research, non-profit and foundation research, grant writing, technical writing and corporate training and development, career counseling, crisis intervention, and teaching. The skills developed in her former professional roles have enhanced her genealogical research in the areas of research methodologies, interviewing relatives, analysis and synthesis of data, report writing and lecturing. She conducts research projects for clients interested in discovering their genealogy and family histories, including details that provide a story to be told and remembered for our most cherished family members. She enjoys setting our ancestors' stories against the back-drop of history to enable clients to understand their relatives' choices, challenges and triumphs. Art Gallery at CAS: Recent Photographs by Arthur Hillman

Arthur Hillman is exhibiting photographs in the upstairs gallery/reception area of the synagogue taken over the past few months. Among the portfolios represented are landscapes from the Berkshires and architectonic images from Mass MoCA, The Clark Art Institute and the Boston Museum of Fine Arts. The exhibition will continue through June.



A photographer, printmaker and designer, Arthur has been exhibiting his prints for more than 50 years. His work has been presented in over 20 one-person shows and in many national print exhibitions and group exhibits including ones at the Dulin Gallery of Art, Hunterdon Art Center, Northern Illinois University, Philadelphia Print Club, Pratt Graphics Center, University of North Dakota, Berkshire Museum, Williams College and the Library of Congress. His silver gelatin photographs, digital prints, and photo silk screen prints are included in collections throughout the country.

Arthur received a B.F.A. from the Philadelphia College of Art in 1966 and his M.F.A. from the University of Massachusetts at Amherst in 1968. He taught at the Massachusetts College of Art from 1968-1974 and was on the visual arts faculty of Simon's Rock from 1974-2011. He is currently Professor Emeritus, Bard College at Simon's Rock.

I went on line to see if I could find examples of absence notes made up by children, but found examples of these actual notes written by parents with the spelling intact.


- 1. My son is under a doctor's care and should not take PE today. Please execute him.

- 9, Please excuse jimmy for being. It was his father's fault.
- 10. I kept Billie home because she had to go Christmas shopping because I don't know what size she wear.
- 11. Please excuse Jennifer for missing school yesterday. We forgot to get the Sunday paper off the porch, and when we found it on Monday. We thought it was Sunday.
- 12. Sally won't be in school a week from Friday. We have to attend her funeral.
