Milchidika with Marty: What is milk's favorite cookie?

Since Isabelle and I have been stuck in the house due to the Coronavirus problem, and I am both the family cook and food shopper; I haven't really wanted to wander into our local Big Y supermarket to do our weekly food shopping.

Thankfully, my daughter has been doing most of our food shopping from my internet food shopping list that I send to her, and then driving an hour and a half from her house in Rhinebeck, New York to our house in Stockbridge; leaving the food packages in the garage; as she doesn't want to come into the house for fear of infecting us.

We stand long distance in the garage and chat about the family, her daughter, and my great granddaughter; and then she drives an hour-and-a-half back to her home. That is a great daughter.

We also have been ordering meat on-line from Omaha butchers, as well as prepared meals from Blue Apron. So, all in all, meals have been more luxurious than normal.

Since I do not like to bother my daughter too often when we run out of little things like ketchup, breadcrumbs, and Parmesan cheese--after all, it's a three-hour trip for her, I had to find a place where I could buy these little odds and ends where there would not be a lot of shoppers, and where I would not feel at risk.

Lo and behold, I found all of these groceries at our local gas station. I go in each day missing small items like a jar of relish, or a can of soup, paper plates and other non-essentials. Amazingly, they seem to have it all. I just saw that on one of the shelves there were boxes of chicken stuffing mix. But no toilet paper. If I only knew where to buy a chicken.

So, they have been my source of odds and ends shopping; wearing a mask, looking through the window of the gas station shop to see that there are no other people in the shop before I will venture inside.

Since we do not have any place to buy a cake, they have been my source of cookie substitutes. And that is where I come to Oreo Cookies.



Isabelle and I were sitting at our kitchen table munching on first one, then two, then three Oreos; and saying all the time "this is absolutely my last one," before closing the box and putting it away. I then began to wonder "How did the name Oreo arise?" I noticed that on the cookie wrapper, there was a note that this was "Milk's favorite cookie."

By the way, it is psychologically impossible to eat just one cookie.

And here is what I discovered about Oreo cookies:

- 1. No one knows where the name originated:
 The cookie was first introduced in 1912 and 450 billion cookies have been sold since it was first introduced. But no one seems to know how the name originated. One guess is that it is a combination of "re" in "cream" and two "o's" in chocolate.
- 2. The ratio of the ingredients in the cookie are very precise: The cookie to creme ratio is always, without fail 71% to 29%.

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


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
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
